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**STATUS OF STATE ENVIRONMENTAL AGENCY BUDGETS (EAB),
2013-2015
March 15, 2017**

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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

State environmental agencies operate the majority of federally delegated and authorized programs and manage funds to implement related environmental regulations. In July 2016, ECOS sought state environmental agency budget data (EAB) for the 50 states, the District of Columbia, and Puerto Rico, hereinafter referred to as “states.” ECOS received 48 responses.² Louisiana, New Jersey, New Mexico, and North Carolina did not report information. This *ECOS Green Report* provides information on state EABs for fiscal years (FY) 2013, FY2014 and FY2015. It focuses on changes and trends in these budgets, including analysis of changes to the three main funding sources: state general funds, federal funding, and fees or other sources. For an example of the budget sheet provided to states for responses, please see Appendix 5.

Overall, from FY2013 to FY2015:

1. The sum total and average of state EABs of 47 reporting states rose 7% or \$674M. ECOS notes California Environmental Protection Agency’s (CalEPA) budget is significantly larger than other states and experienced substantial expansion during this reporting period. If CalEPA is included, the total of 48 reporting state EABs rose 23% or \$2.75B. Average state EAB without CalEPA is \$203M, and the median is \$122M with or without CalEPA.
2. Looking at individual funding sources, state EAB **general fund support** increased 35% without CalEPA or \$335M. With CalEPA included, general fund support totals increased 53%. Over three years, general fund support comprises on average 12% of state EAB support without CalEPA. Overall, general fund support is the smallest of the three major funding sources considered in this report.
3. **Federal government funding support** to state EAB totals decreased 3% without CalEPA included, dropping \$64M over the two budget periods. (With CalEPA, it increased from \$2.75B to \$2.87B in FY2013-2014 and decreased from \$2.87B to \$2.83B). Federal funds make up on average 27% of state EABs without CalEPA over three years.
4. **Fees and other fund support** totals rose 10%, \$403M, from \$5.8 in FY2013 to \$6.2B in FY2015 or 7% without CalEPA. (With CalEPA included, funding from the fees and other category experienced a much larger increase of 25%, increasing from \$8.4B to \$10.6B). Overall, fees and other sources are the largest major funding source for state EABs comprising on average 62% of state EABs without CalEPA from FY2013-FY2015.

ECOS included only State Revolving Funds (SRFs) for drinking water and clean water in the analysis if states reported that they include them in their total budget calculation. In past reports, ECOS factored in SRF money using available U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) appropriation data for states not including it in their overall budgets. State reported budget numbers solely may be a more accurate reflection of assets available to and managed by the state environmental agency. The management of drinking water and clean water infrastructure funds and the agency responsible for doing so varies from state to state.

Specific questions regarding any state’s program or activities should be directed to the states. Any errors or omissions in this report are the responsibility of ECOS and should be brought to our attention.

KEY CONSIDERATIONS & METHODOLOGY

The following is a list of key considerations about ECOS' methodology and data review when preparing analyses within this report:

- **This report covers a three-year period.**
Trends in state EABs may arise over longer time scales and may not be apparent from a three-year view with two observable budget cycle changes.
- **ECOS did not adjust for inflation. This means that the value of the dollars reported could be lower when expended.**
- **ECOS cautions comparing overall state EAB totals in this report to previous ECOS state EAB report totals.**

ECOS recognizes that clean water and drinking water SRF infrastructure funding is an important and significant source of federal funding that supports protection of human health and environment at the state and local level. This report only includes clean water and drinking water SRF from a state's overall EAB calculations if a state agency reported a portion or all of these funds were a part of their overall budget. In past ECOS budget reports, clean water and drinking water SRF were added to state agency EAB based on EPA appropriation data for states that excluded these funds from their budget calculation.

This is important as SRF enacted funding in FY2013 was \$2.237B and Categorical Grant funding was \$1.032B, less than half the SRF total. In addition, Categorical Grants are further reduced in proportion to SRF funding as there are approximately 19 individual Categorical Grants in total that receive funding each year. Some of these funds target tribes, and others like pesticides funding often go to a state agricultural agency rather than the state environmental agency. State-reported budget numbers solely may be a more accurate reflection of assets available to and managed by the state environmental agency.

- **There is variance in how states receive SRFs. Some states receive SRFs fully through the environmental agency. In others, the state receives only Drinking Water (DW) or Clean Water (CW) SRFs. Sometimes a state environmental agency receives no SRF monies.³**

Twenty-three states "included" both CW and DW SRF in their overall budget totals. Six states "included" either CW SRF or DW SRF in their budget but not both. Nineteen states did not include SRF funds in their overall EABs,⁴ with the exception that some may have included allowable SRF set-aside funds. Individual state responses are found in Appendix 4. States that did not include SRF in their total budget had the option of reporting the amount received for reference. However, these specific reported SRF figures were not used in any calculations.

- **For the 23 states that "included" SRF monies in their budget, this inclusion may only represent a portion of the total SRF amount received.**
States that "included" CW and/or DW SRF in their EAB may have only factored a

portion of the total SRF money received by the state if some of it is distributed to other state departments. In some cases, states labeling the funds as “included” may have only included SRF administrative costs in their budget totals.

- **States may choose how much administration costs they take from Drinking Water and Clean Water SRF monies. ECOS did not request this information in detail.**

Environmental agencies may take up to 4% of CWSRF money and up to 31% of DWSRF money in order to cover administrative and other costs.

- **The reported budget information presented in this report may not represent a state’s entire environmental portfolio and may represent only a portion of a state’s total environmental spending.**

For instance, many states fund pesticides work through their departments of agriculture or fund drinking water activities through a state department of health. Some states include either public health or natural resource functions with their state environmental agencies and others do not. *ECOS asked states to only report on programs within the responding agency.* If a state has combined programs such as natural resources and environment, *ECOS asked states to exclude natural resource funding in the information shared with ECOS.* For example, the Delaware Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Council includes both natural resource and environmental functions, but the budget information shown is for environmental activities only exclusive of natural resource functions.⁵

- **Comparisons from one state to another are limited and may yield inaccurate results.**

For instance, state EABs may differ because of:

- Different environmental programs targeted to features/local priorities such as beaches, mountains, drought, wildfires, hurricane response, etc.
- Different programs in which a state has sought delegation or authorization.
- Different composition of state regulatory or compliance assistance services.
- The number and breadth of regulated facilities.
- Different industry sectors such as mining, manufacturing, agriculture, etc.
- State-specific revenue sources such as dedicated state taxes, landfill tipping fees, etc.
- State-specific requirements for regulated facilities and related state agency staff support.

- **Readers should be aware that a number of states use a July 1 to June 30 fiscal year cycle whereas EPA uses a fiscal year cycle from October 1 to September 30.**

- **Five states have a biennial budget: Indiana, Kansas, North Dakota, Oregon and Wyoming.**

For Indiana, Kansas, and North Dakota, ECOS reflected half of the total biennial budget amount for each year the budget covered. Oregon and Wyoming responded on an annual basis.

FINDINGS

A. State EABs Increased

Table 1 includes details of total state EAB and its major funding sources. The following text reflects figures found in this table.

ECOS asked states to report figures for three major funding sources comprising their total EAB:

- 1) General Funds
- 2) Federal Government
- 3) Fees/Other Sources

The sum total of all state EABs of the 48 reporting states rose from \$12.2B in FY2013 to \$14.9B in FY2015, an increase of 23%. This large observed increase is primarily due to changes in California's budget over the same period.⁶ California's state EAB grew from approximately \$2.9B in FY2013 to \$4.9B in FY2015, an increase of 69%, accounting for \$2B of the overall \$2.75B national increase of state budgets. Considering state EABs excluding CalEPA, the overall national state EAB total increase was \$9.3B in FY2013 to \$10.0B in FY2015, \$674M, or 7%.

Considering average state EABs, these increased from \$198.1M in FY2013 to \$212.5M in FY2015, \$14.3M, a 7% increase exclusive of CalEPA. If CalEPA is included, the average state EAB increased from \$253.8M in FY2013 to \$311.0M in FY2015, an increase of 23%. The median state EAB increased from \$119.9M in FY2013 to \$121.8M in FY2015 or a 2% increase with CalEPA included.

Looking at individual funding sources, state EAB general fund support increased from \$945M in FY2013 to \$1.1B in FY2015, \$335M, an increase of 35% without CalEPA. With CalEPA included, general fund support totals increased from \$986.0M to \$1.5B, or a 53% increase. The average general fund amount increased 35% from \$20.1M in FY2013 to \$27.2M in FY2015 without CalEPA. With CalEPA included, the average general fund amount increased by 53% from \$20.5M in FY2013 to \$31.3M in FY2015.

Federal government funding support to state EAB totals decreased 3% without CalEPA included, dropping \$64M over the two budget periods. (With CalEPA, it increased from \$2.75B to \$2.87B in FY2013-2014 and decreased from \$2.87B to \$2.83B). Without CalEPA, the average funding from the federal government decreased from \$54.4M in FY2013 to \$53.1M in FY2015, a 3% decrease. It should be noted that many federal grants require state matching funds.

State EAB fees and other fund support totals rose from \$5.8B in FY2013 to \$6.2B in FY2015, or 10%, \$403M, without CalEPA. With CalEPA included, funding from the fees and other category increased from \$8.4B to \$10.6B, a much larger increase of 25%. Without CalEPA's state EAB included, the average fees and other funding support rose from \$123.6M in FY2013 to \$132.2M in FY2015, or a 7% increase. With CalEPA, the average fees and other support rose from \$176.0M

⁶ CalEPA's budget significantly increased from FY2013 to FY2015 for several reasons. First, in 2014 California's drinking water program was transferred from the Department of Public Health to the State Water Resources Control Board within CalEPA. This transfer amounted to a budget increase of over \$200 million. Also in 2014, California voters passed Proposition 1. This proposition authorized \$7.5 billion in general obligation bonds to address the impacts of the drought, including \$1.8 billion appropriated to the Water Board for water storage, water quality, flood protection, watershed restoration and protection, and safe drinking water improvements in disadvantaged communities.

in FY2013 to \$220.5M in FY2015, a 25% increase. In addition to fees/other being the largest major state EAB funding source, it also had the largest dollar amount increase of all three categories from FY2013 to FY2015 with or without CalEPA.

For all calculations, ECOS used the state EAB reported shown in Appendix 4. Subcategory average percentages in Table 1 are calculated by dividing the average subtotal by the average state EAB.

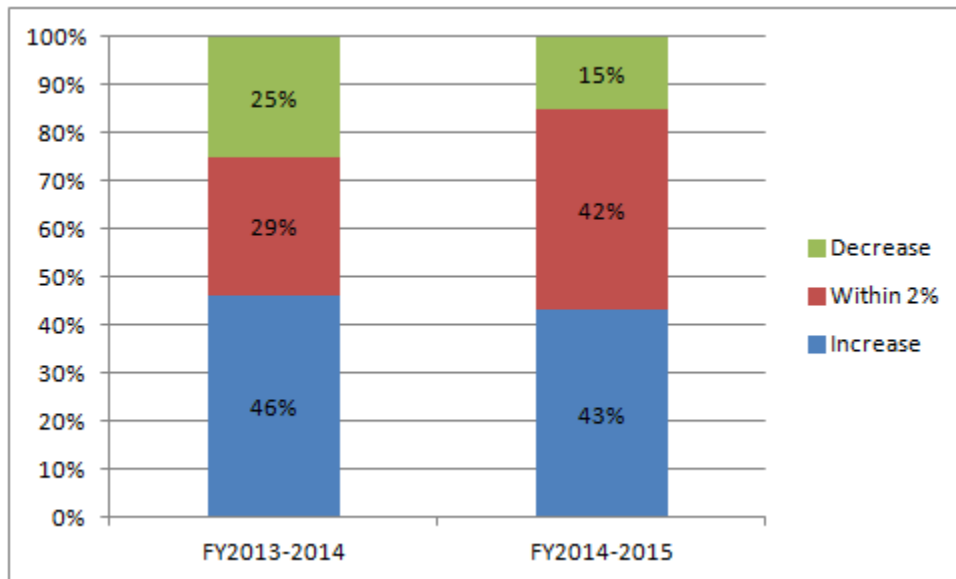

Table 2 shows 22 state EABs (46%) increased from FY2013-FY2014 and 21 state EABs increased (43%) from FY2014-2015. Which states increased or decreased varied within these timeframes. While Wyoming was one of the states showing an increasing budget, its state EAB would be considered neutral for both timeframes if one-time pass-through money is excluded. From FY2013 to FY2014, 12 states (25%) showed declining budgets, whereas only seven state EABs (15%) decreased from FY2014 to FY2015. Fourteen states (29%) stayed within a two percent increase or decrease change from FY2013 to FY2014, while 20 (42%) were within the range from FY2014 to FY2015. Figure 1 summarizes percent change of state budget information. See Appendix 1 for information on the percent change for each individual state budget.

Figure 1. Summary of Percent Change of Total State EABs in FY2013 to FY2014 and FY2014 to FY2015



The following trends show average percentage change across states with a greater than two percent increase or decrease between years as shown in Table 2. Note that these percentages do not include changes that stayed within a two percent increase or decrease change.

- From FY2013 to FY2014, the average state EAB increase was 15%.
- From FY2014 to FY2015, the average state EAB increase was 18%.
- From FY2013 to FY2014, the average state EAB decrease was 13%.
- From FY2014 to FY2015, the average state EAB decrease was 9%.

B. From FY2013 to FY2015, General Fund and Fees and Other Funds Increased, Amid Small Decline in Federal Government Funding

State EAB **general fund support** increased from \$945M in FY2013 to \$1.1B in FY 2015, \$335M, an increase of 35% without CalEPA. With CalEPA included, general fund support totals increased from \$986.0M to \$1.5B, or a 53% increase as shown by Table 1, Row F. Without CalEPA, general funds make up on average 12% of state EABs over three years.

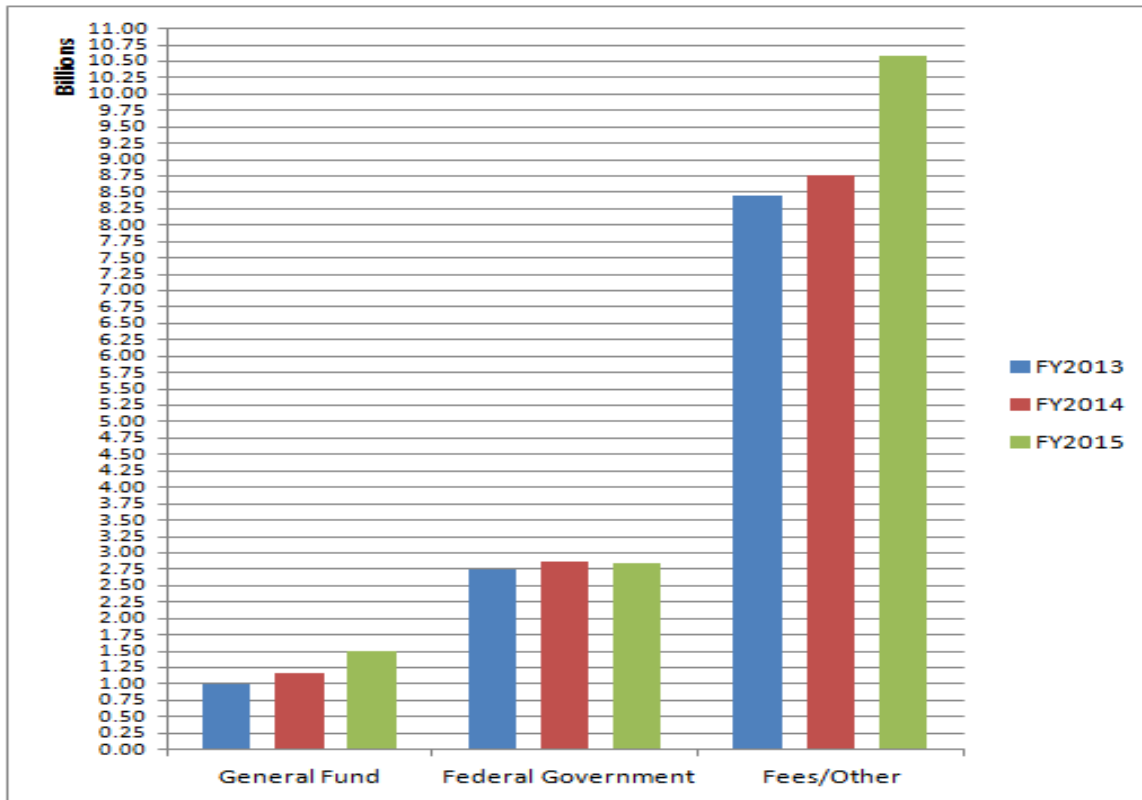
Federal government fund support to state EAB totals decreased 3% without CalEPA included, dropping \$64M over the two budget years as shown by Table 1, Row K. With CalEPA, it increased from \$2.75B to \$2.87B in FY2013-2014 and decreased from \$2.87B to \$2.83B as shown in Table 1, Row J. Federal funds make up on average 27% percent of state EABs without CalEPA over three years.

State EAB **fees and other fund support** totals rose from \$5.8B in FY2013 to \$6.2B in FY2015 or 10%, without CalEPA. With CalEPA included, funding from the fees and other category increased from \$8.4B to \$10.6B, a much larger increase of 25%, as shown by Table 1, Rows N and O. This is a much larger increase primarily reflecting the impacts of Proposition 1 passed in 2014, adding a large amount of general obligation bonds to address the impacts of drought to CalEPA's budget. For some programs, the responsible state local, tribal, or EPA permitting authority may be obligated by statute to collect fees sufficient to fund all reasonable permit program costs from those sources required to obtain operating permits.

Overall, fees and other sources are the largest major funding source for state EABs comprising on average 62% of state EAB support without CalEPA over three years.

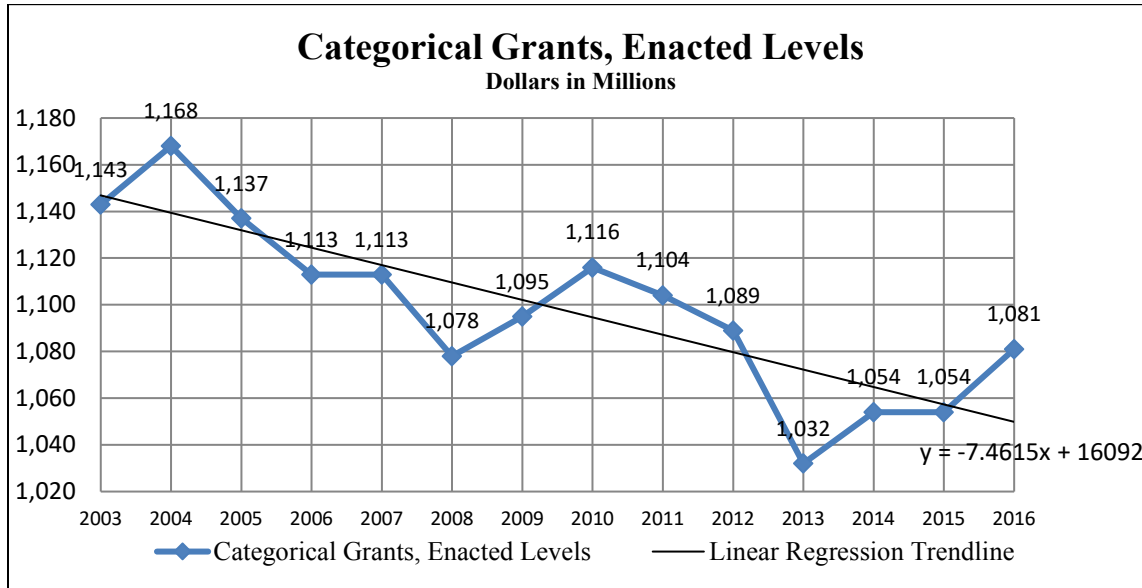
Figure 2. State EAB Funding by Source for 46 states, D.C., Puerto Rico in FY13-FY15

Figure 2 summarizes changes in funding from general funds, federal funding, and fees and other sources.

A significant source of federal funding to states for program work is State and Local Tribal Assistance Categorical Grants (STAG). U.S. Congressionally enacted funds for Categorical Grants from FY 2003 to FY 2015 declined; FY 2013 is the lowest Categorical Grant enacted level in the 13-year period shown in Figure 3. Concurrent with this decline of federal funding, state-reported budgets show increased support from fees/other and from general funds between FY13 to FY15.

It is important to note that state EABs also receive federal funding from EPA for clean water and drinking water infrastructure, a source of significant funding. In addition, EPA provides to states funding for Superfund cleanups, underground storage tank cleanups, brownfields cleanup and redevelopment, and other projects separate from Categorical Grants. EPA also provides funding that may go directly to local governments (funds that are not considered in this report).

C. State EAB Funding Category Composition Varies

Figures 4a, 4b and 4c demonstrate funding by category to states as a percent of their EAB for FY2015:

- General fund support ranged from 1.0% in Missouri to 61.6% in Alaska. AZ, IL, and NV did not report receiving general fund support.
- Federal funding ranged from 5.3% in Hawaii to 59.4% in North Dakota, a wide range.
- Fees and other ranged from 13.9% in Alaska to 90.6% in Missouri.

Figure 4a. State EAB Percentage of General Funding Support, FY 2015¹⁰

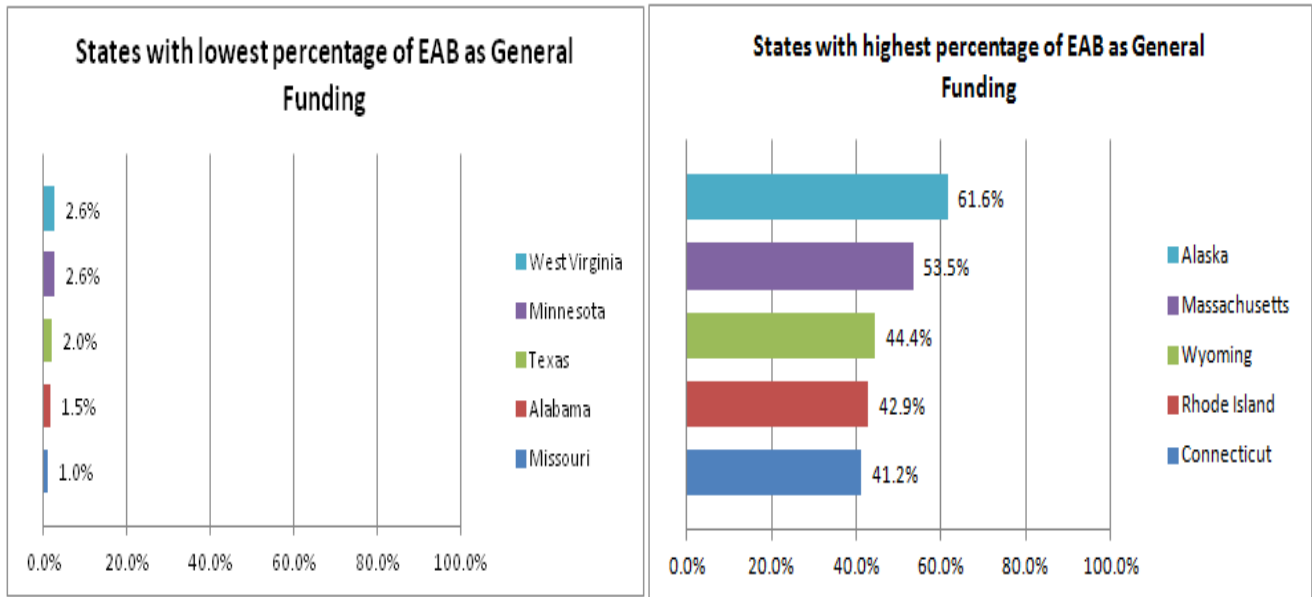
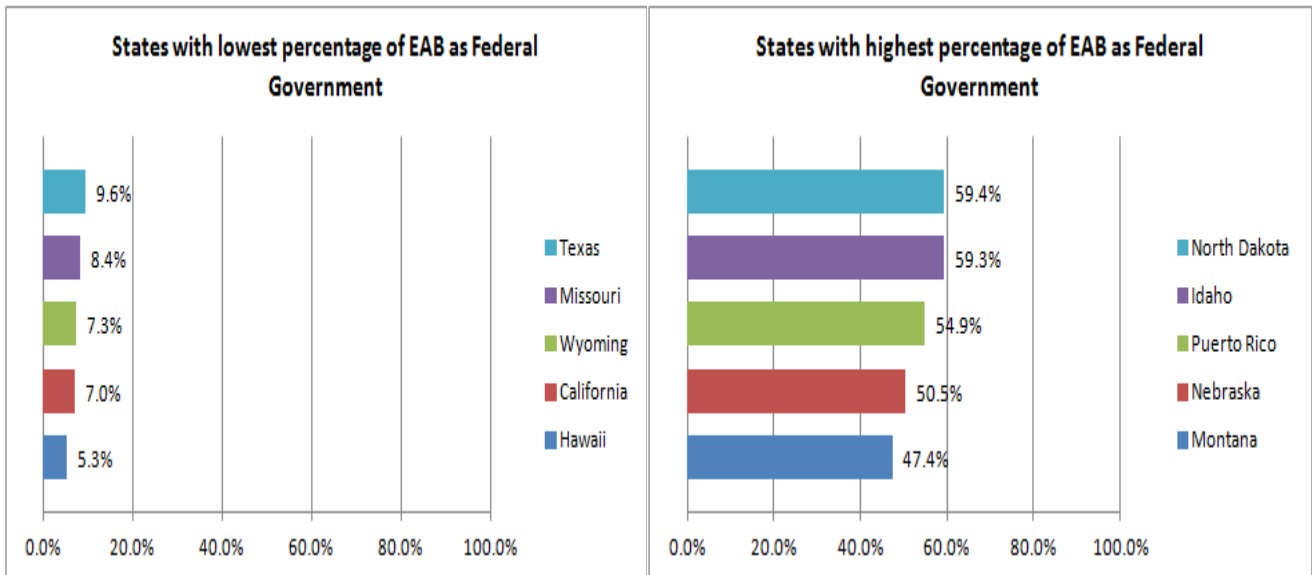


Figure 4b. State EAB Percentage of Federal Funding Support, FY 2015¹¹

Figure 4c. State EAB Percentage of Fees and Other Funding Support, FY 2015¹²

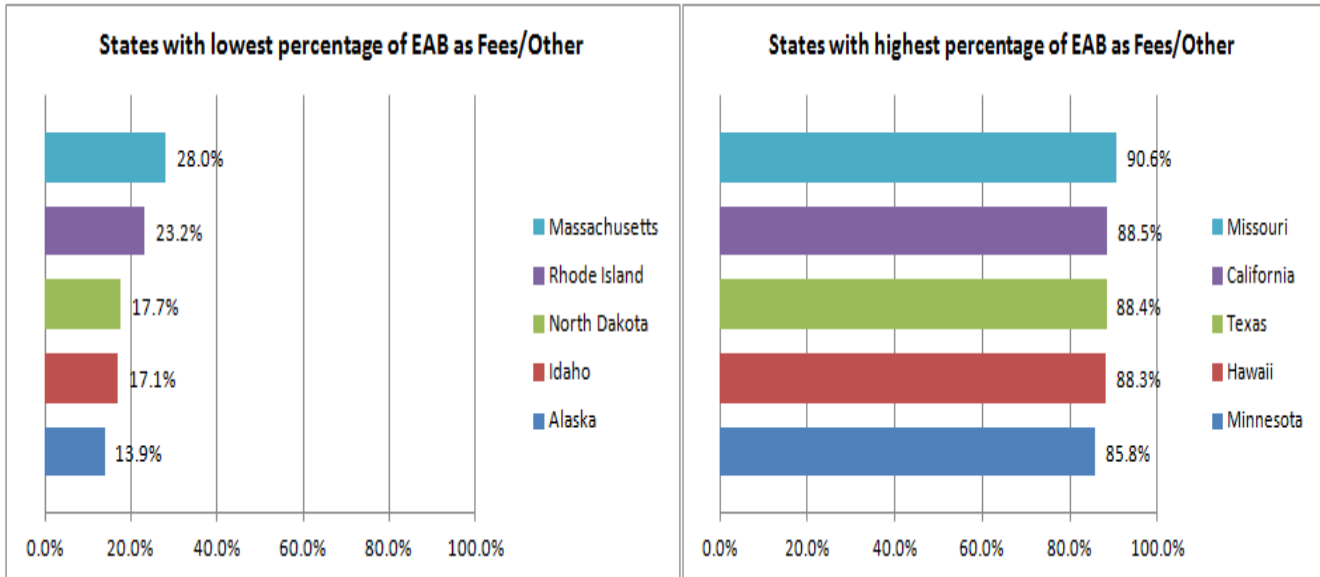
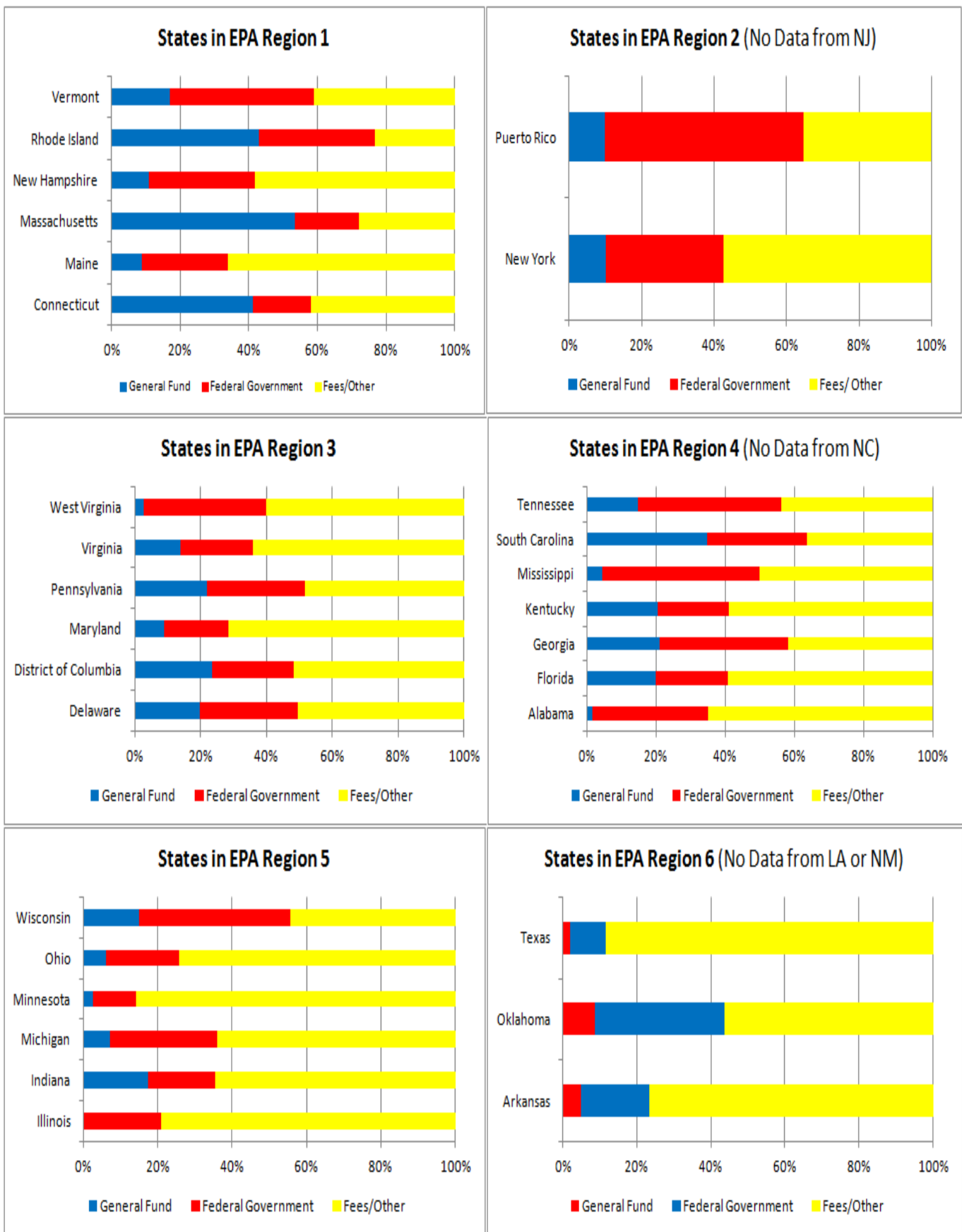
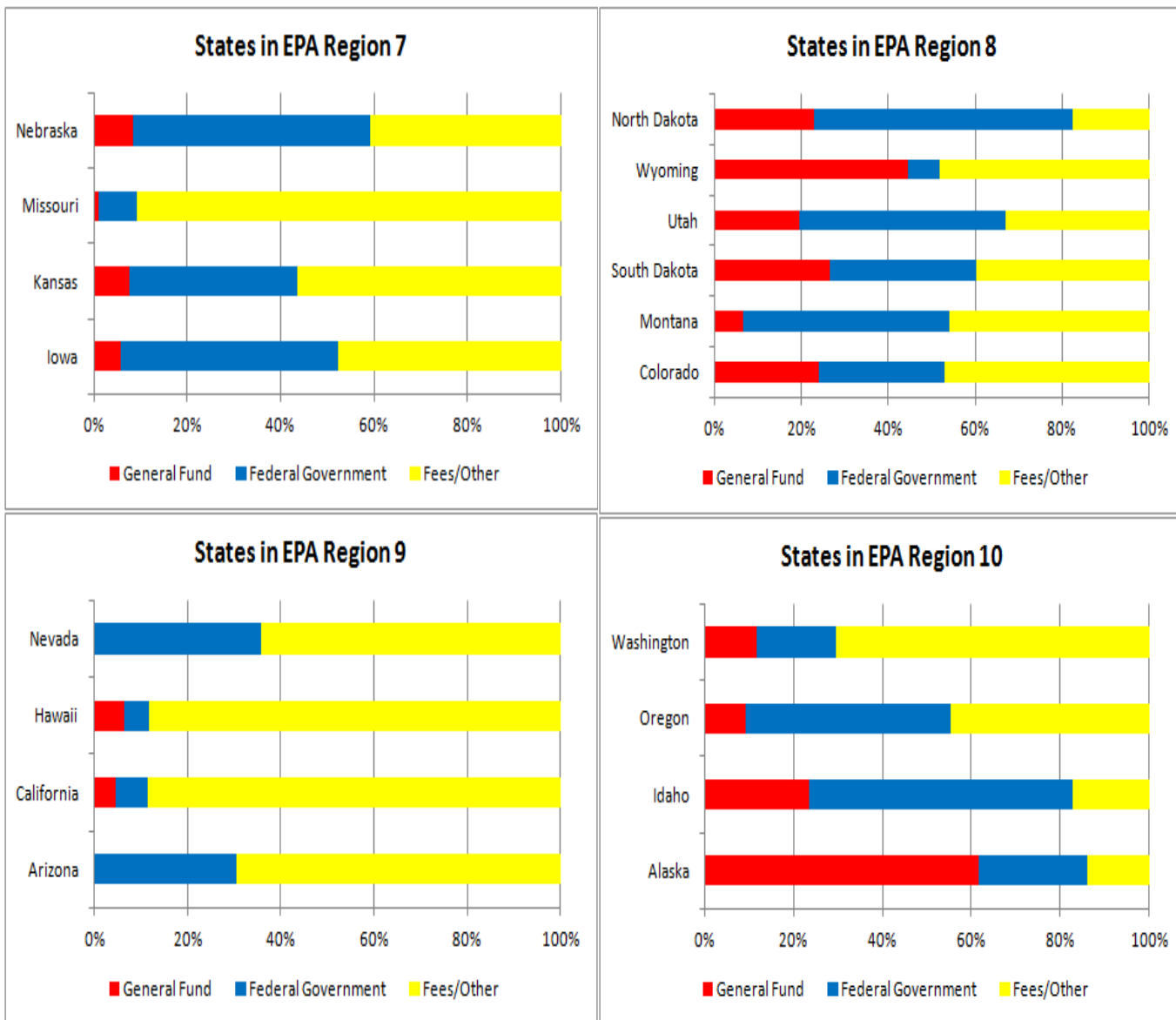

D. State Average EAB per Capita Spending Increased from FY2013 to FY2015 (Data Per Capita)

ECOS considered the total EAB for FY2013, FY2014, and FY2015 compared to U.S. Census population data in each state for each respective year to determine state EAB per capita values. These normalized amounts by state are located in Appendix 2.

ECOS notes the range decreased comparing FY2013 to FY2014, with the lower amount climbing from \$10.53 to \$11.31 and the upper amount falling from \$199.97 to \$199.69. The average state EAB per capita increased from \$49.4 in FY2013 to \$53.6 in FY2015, an increase of 8.5%.

In addition, ECOS used normalization by comparing each state’s gross domestic product (GDP) with the EAB for FY2013, FY2014, and FY2015. No states had a percentage for their EABs higher than 0.5% of their GDP in any given year.

CONCLUSION

Overall, from FY2013 to FY2015:

1. The sum total and average of state EABs of 47 reporting states rose 7% or \$674M. ECOS notes California Environmental Protection Agency's (CalEPA) budget is significantly larger than other states and experienced substantial expansion during this reporting period. If CalEPA is included, the total of 48 reporting state EABs rose 23% or \$2.75B. Average state EAB without CalEPA is \$203M, and the median is \$122M with or without CalEPA.
2. Looking at individual funding sources, state EAB **general fund support** increased 35% without CalEPA or \$335M. With CalEPA included, general fund support totals increased 53%. Over three years, general fund support comprises on average 12% of state EAB support without CalEPA. Overall, general fund support is the smallest of the three major funding sources considered in this report.
3. **Federal government funding support** to state EAB totals decreased 3% without CalEPA included, dropping \$64M over the two budget periods. (With CalEPA, it increased from \$2.75B to \$2.87B in FY2013-2014 and decreased from \$2.87B to \$2.83B). Federal funds make up on average 27% of state EABs without CalEPA over three years.
4. **Fees and other fund support** totals rose 10%, \$403M, from \$5.8 in FY2013 to \$6.2B in FY2015 or 7% without CalEPA. (With CalEPA included, funding from the fees and other category experienced a much larger increase of 25%, increasing from \$8.4B to \$10.6B). Overall, fees and other sources are the largest major funding source for state EABs comprising on average 62% of state EABs without CalEPA from FY2013-FY2015.

State environmental agencies are increasingly reliant on vital state resources to implement federal programs. The total sum and average of federal funds both fell exclusive of CalEPA. This drop coincides with stagnation in Categorical Grant funding from the federal government, although ECOS recognizes that states receive funding from other EPA sources in addition to Categorical Grants.
