At 7,000 feet above sea level, the Fall Meeting will provide an unparalleled opportunity for states and partners to take innovation to new heights. Thought leaders will explore forward-looking approaches in PFAS risk communication, water cybersecurity, resiliency, infrastructure, air, climate, energy, environmental justice, land revitalization, and agency management. In the ECOS tradition of "rip-off and deploy" (R&D), participants can expect to return to their home organizations with a new repertoire of bipartisan, common-sense approaches to safeguarding human health and the environment.

Notes:

- 1) Except where highlighted in green, all sessions are open to all registrants, including press.
- 2) Dress is business casual. Layers and a warm jacket are recommended for Park City in September.
- 3) Breakfasts and lunches will be held in the Sundial Pavilion. Follow second floor hallway signs for the exit to Canyons Village. Once outside, walk up the short stairway and to the white tent.
- 4) The Grand Summit Hotel is undergoing HOA-ordered installation of heated pavers along the main drive and pool. Upon arrival at Canyons Village, follow signs to enter the hotel lobby through the parking garage. To compensate ECOS attendees for this disruption, the hotel has reduced the nightly resort fee from \$35 to \$10.
