

## Growth in U.S. methane mitigation businesses

Tracks increases in total # of unique locations and firms







Methane is the main ingredient in natural gas. Every year US operators waste **\$3.5 billion** worth of natural gas, enough to serve **19 million homes**.

Standards create jobs and spur homegrown industries – the number of manufacturing firms has increased by **88%** over the last decade, while the number of service firms has grown by **105%** over the past seven years.

Great news coming out of beautiful Cheyenne, Wyoming today: Wyoming's Environmental Quality Council (EQC) voted 5-0 in support of adopting New Source rules that will reduce methane emissions from all oil and gas wells constructed or modified after December 6, 2022. This rulemaking, set in motion by the 2024 EPA Methane Rule, will cut energy waste while delivering cleaner air, economic benefits, and more tax revenue throughout the state.
